Leash 'em — keep 'em safe!

 ${\cal E}$ veryone is jubilant with the recent rescue of Teddy, the border-collie mix.

Soon after being adopted from the Hillside SPCA in June 2008, he ran from his unfamiliar new surroundings and became lost on the Sharp Mountain near Pottsville.

For weeks, then months, we distributed and posted hundreds of flyers. Unfortunately, sightings became nearly non-existent. The heartwrenching thoughts of our gentle, beautiful boy, frightened and struggling to survive, caused many sleepless nights.

Is he hurt?...cold?...still alive? We printed more posters and continued our quest. We would never give up. Neighbors and friends continued their lookout, spurred by very infrequent but hopeful sightings.

Dana Smith-Mansell, a longtime Hillside supporter, came to our aid. She had spotted Teddy near her backyard at the mountain base. Even through our brutally cold winter, Teddy had endured; somehow the mountain sustained him.

Dana became Teddy's guardian angel. She provided irresistible food and clean





water on a set schedule. He began to return almost regularly for his meals.

Through trial and error, Dana realized humane traps could not outsmart this boy. He wouldn't set foot inside them no matter how hungry he was. Patiently she planned and set up an elaborate kennel-capture system.

It worked. On July 6, 2009 at 6:20 a.m., Teddy was in our arms once again! Teddy's "story" is captured in Dana's blog: http://savingteddy.blogspot.com/

Leash 'em—keep 'em safe (continued)

Dana, Janine of Hillside, and the many members of "Friends of Teddy Club" from across the country, are reminding everyone about the importance of keeping pets safe with an educational program called "Leash 'em — Keep 'em Safe.

Here are some important facts to keep in mind when protecting your dog. If not leashed, they may:

- Jump a fence or push through an open door or gate in an instant
- Run into the street and get hit by a vehicle
- Get lost (many dogs can't find their way home)
- Be captured by someone with bad intentions
- Fall victim to traps, poisoning, etc.
- Scare people
- Be shot by someone protecting their property
- Chase bikes or other animals
- Get attacked by animals



Keep a firm grip on the leash when getting dogs into and from vehicles. Be certain the collar cannot slide off and always keep ID on the collar.

Neutering pets discourages the urge to roam. Remember that dogs will be dogs. He does not "know better". You can trust your dog will behave like a dog, and your dog will not behave like a person.

They do not come "fully-trained" because we all have different expectations. He will not be a "good dog" without any guidance. It takes some serious obedience training to have a "reliable" off-leash dog and even they can sometimes slip up.

There's trouble out there for animals running at large and there are leash laws. Those same laws keep the guardian, the dog, and others safe from unexpected accidents and incidents.

Having a pet is a huge responsibility and lifelong commitment. He depends on you to keep him safe. A dog leash could save your dog's life — so use them, don't lose them. A single lost dog is one too many!



A valiant effort


A frantic phone call about a stray cat with an arrow through his neck prompted our feline manager to speed to the rescue. Adept at handling felines in some of the most trying situations, Becky spotted the wounded cat in a ravine outside of Pottsville; reaching him required some sure-footed scaling on her part.

After patiently coaxing the frightened cat to trust

her, she managed to get him into a large carrier and climb to the top. The cat, later named Custer, was hurting, even though he was just calmly sitting there when he was spotted.

Carefully secured in the carrier and brought to the Hillside, he was then taken to a vet for treatment. The arrow was removed, infected tissue was cut away and he was neutered — what an ordeal for handsome, ten-month-old Custer!

The arrow may have been in his neck for over four days, but luckily, it missed anything vital even though it was an arrow that had pieces of razors on the shaft.



Police gathered information which hopefully would lead to an arrest for animal cruelty, but unfortunately, they ran into a dead end.

Custer was placed in foster care since his wound needed special attention and would have to heal from the inside out. Tragically, even though Custer was given the best possible care, the infection was not able to be contained and he died from complications.

The only solace we have comes from knowing we tried our very best to save him, and that his last days were safely spent in comfort, in a loving foster home.

We then concluded, and a veterinarian later agreed, that Canal had a severe infestation of ear mites which are tiny critters that live inside a cat's ear canals, feeding off the blood in the soft tissue. They first leave their dark brown debris inside the ear but it can accumu-

late outside the ear where it is noticed and then treated.

The ears become very itchy and are scratched for relief. Canal must have suffered and been in great discomfort for a very long time. The mite debris was so impacted it is unlikely Canal

He was not a happy camper during the removal procedure, but what relief he must have felt when it was finally gone!

We at Hillside have come to expect the unexpected and the worst...which explains why we suspected that a horrible act of cruelty was inflicted on poor Canal. It turned out, of course, that in desperation to relieve the itch and pain from the mites, he severely lacerated his own ears. Had he not been discovered, he likely could have seriously severed his ears at their bases.
