Hoarding Nightmare

Hillside was contacted by officials in a nearby town to assist with removing 17 cats from a house where they were found to be living in deplorable conditions.

Humane Officers and staff rescued 16 cats and discovered six more deceased inside the now condemned residence. Traps were set to ensure no elusive cat would be left behind as we departed. As a result, one more cat has been rescued.

Because of the sudden intake of a large number of animals at the shelter level, every hoarding situation can be problematic.

Hoarders often amass a large number of animals; sometimes they may not even know the total number in their care. It's been

reported companion animals such as cats and dogs are involved in as many as 65 percent of hoarding cases. Most of those animals ultimately require special care often having not been provided their basic minimal needs including water, veterinary care, sanitary conditions, and food.

The crowded and filthy conditions can lead to flea infestations, worms, mange, ear mites, upper respiratory infections, matted fur and more. This can mean severe neglect to the animals these people are responsible for resulting in disease, starvation — and death. Sadly, the impact of that failure to provide properly ultimately lands directly on the animals.

The immediate needs of the surviving cats were quickly attended to upon their arrival at the Hillside SPCA and they will continue to be evaluated as they settle in and become comfortable. They're thoroughly enjoying good food, clean litter, cold water, and soft beds. They've also discovered every cat's dream — birdwatching from their enclosed porch!



Please contact humane officials and the police if you suspect animals are being collected, neglected, or abused by their care-takers. At least 57 percent of animal-hoarding cases are brought to authorities' attention by the hoarder's neighbors.

Neighborhood concerns may cite the smell of ammonia and other odors, unsanitary conditions, more than the typical number of companion

be adopted. I would love for you to experience first-hand their expressions of gratitude to you. You would be overwhelmed with love and happiness.





n July 25, 2017, we experienced the largest cat confiscation in the history of Hillside SPCA — 99 cats! Uncannily, on the exact same day one year later, July 25, 2018, we answered another cruelty call (see Page 1). This time we found 16 surviving cats living in shockingly horrendous conditions. (Another was later humanely trapped after our initial departure and brought to the Hillside SPCA.)

Sadly, six more felines found in the house had crossed the Rainbow Bridge. This brought tears to the eyes of everyone involved. It is heart-wrenching to think of any animal dying alone in those awful conditions and nobody even noticing their absence or passing!

In addition to dealing with very unsanitary living quarters, it was one of the worst flea infestations we'd ever seen. Our cruelty officers' arms and legs were relentlessly attacked and bitten by fleas! Spraying themselves with insecticide did nothing to deter them.

Work began in earnest when the sixteen anxious cats arrived at the shelter. Surprisingly, most were in fairly decent physical condition except, of course, for serious flea problems. The cats scratched constantly, the result of the feasting of fleas all over their bodies, and many of them suffered severe hair loss.

We dealt with the flea infestations and the happy cats will soon be sporting full bodies of fur. They are already looking quite handsome and pretty! They will be ready and waiting for their forever homes;



homes that will always be flea free! We encourage you to visit us and witness their transformation.

Unfortunately, animal neglect and cruelty are a fact of life. We at Hillside are dedicated to eradicating that kind of behavior and helping and caring for our furry friends—friends that have no voice. You, our loving and generous supporters, are also dedicated and passionate. We, and the animals we help, deeply appreciate it, and we love you for it!





Few things are as precious as kittens. Well, babies, puppies, and beautiful sunsets are precious, too. Hillside's outreach to promote spaying and neutering of pets is ongoing. Indeed, our efforts are showing some results but not nearly enough. We still take in hundreds of precious, unwanted kittens each year — HUNDREDS.

There are many responsible pet owners out there and we thank them very much, but sadly, it's the irresponsible ones who cause shelters to literally burst at the seams. We are really grateful to those who choose to trap, release and look after strays in their neighborhoods, but it is still not enough.


When Becky, our feline manager, was looking for a really cute kitten photo, this little guy rolled over as if to say, "Me, take me!"


