Abandoned cat crisis

he Hillside SPCA is a godsend for injured or abused stray cats and dogs.

We continue to inform the public, especially our loyal supporters, of the wonderful things that you and our devoted staff make happen.

Sadly, we also need to let everyone know of the heartless occurrences that should never happen and do not always have happy endings.

We've witnessed a rash of feline cruelties the last six months, the most recent concerning Trapper, Patience (story on page 8) and Sabre, a sweet cat with a broken jaw.

Luckily we were able to come to their rescue, and hopefully, Trapper and Sabre will each find as fabulous a home as did Patience.

Not so lucky though are the 60 cats at the center of a shocking cruelty case currently under investigation.

Becky Moyer, our feline manager, was in tears as she related what she and Janine Choplick, one of our cruelty officers, found in a house in the Auburn, Pa. area.

Hillside was alerted to the situation by the shocked and horrified landlord of the property who discovered the animals after the woman renting the house abandoned it and her cats.

As the Hillside staff entered the property, they found about 20 cats already dead, some for a long time, and 40 more malnourished and in poor health — some literally just skin and bones — with nearly three fourths of them blind to boot!

There was no food or water anywhere nor was there a single litter box, which resulted in several inches of feces and urine covering just about every surface. What a nightmare!

Sad to say, Becky has witnessed many cruelties, but this one is especially disturbing.

The curtains were drawn tight throughout the house, and it appears the cats never saw the light of day. The darkness, combined with poor nutrition, likely caused the blindness so many were suffering from.

The poor cats were so frightened when the house was entered they kept running into walls in an attempt to get away from the rescuers. When food and water were put down for them, they smelled it but were not always able to locate it at first.

Needless to say, capturing most of the cats presents a problem. As of press time, we are *still* trying to trap the very scared, a feat not easily accomplished.

A few younger cats were friendly, but the blind, older, frantic ones need to be trapped. Sadly, most of them are in such extremely bad condition we do not think they can be saved. Becky and others have made, and still need to make, numerous trips to the house, a very time consuming effort at best.

We are hoping to save the younger, less ravaged ones if we can. Time will tell.

At the present time, PA State Police have identified the woman who abandoned the cats and charges of cruelty to animals will be filed in District Court.

Un-spayed and un-neutered cats can quickly produce litter after litter leading to a situation that can easily spiral out of control.

Low cost spay and neuter services are available for cats to help prevent tragedies like this.

dopters on occasion ask why cats adopted from the Hillside are not allowed to roam outside (which should go for any cat - not only ones from us). THIS IS WHY...

The Hillside received a frantic call from a woman telling us one of the stray cats she feeds had become caught on something because he had a trap on his foot.

Shelter staff went to investigate the situation, but by the time they arrived the cat had managed to get away and run up the mountain and then into a mine shaft.

Three days later, the Hillside received another call that the cat had once again come to eat and the woman had contained him in a sheltered area she had put up for the strays.

This time the Hillside folks were successful in being able to sedate and capture the cat. Much to our horror, we found the cat did indeed have a steel-

jawed trap on his foot.

The terror this poor cat felt is heart wrenching — the pain he must have suffered from the crushing jaws of that trap on his foot is unimaginable.

Sadly, even with immediate and extensive treatment in an attempt to save "Trapper's" leg, it had to be amputated.

This is just one of the many reason we insist cats remain indoors and not be allowed to roam whether adopted from the Hillside or not.

Please explain the perils that await roaming cats to anyone you know that allows their cat outside or is

considering doing so. Encourage them to keep their cats and kittens indoors at all times.

Sadly, as Trapper's saga played out, the shelter rescued another cat, an orange tabby we named Patience who suffered the same fate! Caught in a crushing trap, this poor kitty needed immediate
