A quarter century of caring



It is 10:30 at night on February 10th, 2010. I just got home from the shelter after dealing with a storm that dumped 27 inches of snow. (So much for the forecast of 4 to 8 inches...)

It was truly one of our hardest days; coping with cruelty cases, shoveling, shoveling, and shoveling, not being able to keep up with it. Right now, I'm very emotional.

Our animals are safe and warm, bellies filled and sound asleep. They are safe and loved - because of you! You have created a safe haven so that the world cannot hurt them anymore. You have saved thousands of lives that would be gone without you. You have made miracles happen.

I am exhausted and tired and as I look at this milestone that the Hill-side achieves this year, I cannot use the term "celebrate" to describe our 25 years of being here.

Twenty five years ago, when I got a call to help place animals at a shelter where the elderly couple running it had passed away, my naïve thought was that we would get all the animals here a wonder-

ful home and just close down

That was not to be. For every one that left, one or two or five more filled their place. And so it has gone for 25

years since that fateful phone call.

But imagine if we weren't here imagine the lives lost; lives with so much love to offer. I look at those furry faces everyday and thank God for our supporters who made Hillside happen — now that IS something we can be proud of and celebrate!

We are in the final stages of the last building to be put up here at the Hillside facilities. Due to the horrendous winter we are having and every building being filled with animals, we desperately need this one which I'm calling the "Meet and Greet" building.

The problem we face every day is that we don't have a place for adopters to get to know an animal they might choose for adoption. This building will provide quiet, warm rooms for people to get to know the animals — and getting to know them in that kind of setting can make the difference between a pet leaving to go home or going back inside behind the fence.

When we bring a dog out of the "large dog" building, they tend to come out like the start of the Kentucky Derby — they're over-

whelmed to be outside the fence. With all the stimulation and excitement, people don't really see them for the pet that they are.

I believe in my heart that this building will make the difference in them getting adopted and going "home" and *that* is the reason we are here.

Our larger animals are harder to place and my heart breaks because it isn't their fault they got "too big". They have big hearts to go along with their bodies and will give you a large amount of love—it just takes the right atmosphere for that to come out and this building will be it!



Joe's fund provides life-saving treatment



his is a picture of Joe playing with "Pluto", one of the many pets he rescued.

He always seemed to find them or they found him; he told many stories of how they found him (some of which I doubt.) Joe was more comfortable with animals than with people. He felt safe with them.

His birthday is February 21st and he would have been 37 years old. The pain is just as unbearable as the day I lost him.

I know now that you do not get over the death of your child - ever. My family and friends suggested therapy when I lost him.

Joe's Fund and the Hillside are my therapy. Without them, I would be gone. I am so surprised and

elated by the response I have gotten for his fund. It has made my life (and our buddies lives) change forever.

If someone gives me five cents for his fund, I'm elated. His fund makes the difference between life and death for our buddies. Every animal leaving our shelter is now spayed or neutered — a miracle I thought would never happen.

I want to tell you about just one of the cases where you have made the difference... We were called out on a cruelty case for three dogs that were almost dead from starvation, abuse, and neglect. Two were on chains with no shelter and another was just running loose. Their names are Sammy, Pepper, and Sean.

The owner was feeding them rotten potatoes. The temperature that day was 8 degrees. How they survived is beyond me.

We brought them back to the shelter and they thought they were at Disneyworld — good food, warmth, kindness, and love.

Unfortunately, that was just the beginning of their struggle. Sammy & Sean were diagnosed with heartworm in the worst stages—very advanced.

On her second day here, Sammy delivered four puppies that were stillborn. It seemed like everything was against them.

Heartworm is an extremely dangerous condition. Many dogs don't survive the treatment. These dogs' conditions were very poor.

Thanks to you and an anonymous person who could provide a place to help us out in keeping them quiet for 30 days (the most important part of the treatment), they are on the road to recovery!

The ability to provide vital lifesaving treatment to these dogs was a decision that I could only have made because of Joe's Fund; it is an expensive ordeal.

They will not leave this world without knowing love. Joe did not leave this world without knowing love. That is all I want. You — Joe's supporter — have made this possible and I will love you forever for this.

e've always wondered what it was like in the cat room when, at the end of our long days, we closed the doors behind us. If only we had a nanny (kitty?) cam!

With full bellies and nice clean beds and blankets to lie on, with toys in the condos and on the floors, and with nice cat trees to scratch and hang out on, what more could any cat want? Well, besides of course, to be adopted into a loving home.

We always wondered what kind of shenanigans go on, since an occasional tipped litter box, tufts of cat fur, and blankets in disarray are often part of the morning scene when staff arrives. The big snowstorm in February gave Becky, our feline manager, the perfect opportunity to find out.

That bone-chilling, blizzard-like day kept many people home from their jobs, but most of our employees made it in. As the storm intensified, so did the cleaning, feeding and medicating.

They were on their best behavior, because not a ruckus did Becky hear. Well, yes, there was meowing (especially from those in individual cages who wanted out), occasional growls, some running back and forth, toys being batted around, a hairball throw-up or two, a few sneezes and lots of lapping from the water bowls.

Becky's final comment about her experience: "Loved it. It was all in a day's [or night's] work."
