# CAT QUARTERS IN NEED



Back in 1996, thanks to you our generous supporters, we were so proud of our wonderful new feline building. Over the years thousands of cats have passed through that building and called Hillside their home.

We want to continue providing our residents with a comfortable, attractive, catfriendly environment. Unfortunately, 15 years later, our cat quarters are now in dire need of repair.

Time has taken its toll on our building and so have the cats themselves. Many of them free-roam the main floor which consists of cages for newcomers, a nine-foot kitchen counter and a large open space area.

Thousands of daily floor and wall scrubbings have caused the paint to peel, and thousands of little clawed feet that like to use the lower cabinets as scratching posts have reduced them to their cores.

The isolation area, the condos, and the restroom used by

employees and visitors in this same building also need repairs.

You have made Hillside the best animal shelter in the state and have faithfully stepped up to help us when we need assistance. If you would like to donate to our Repair Fund, the 1,700 cats that come through our doors each year — and our dedicated staff — will be so, so, grateful!

Joe did not like the limelight. He always wanted to be in the background. The only time he was comfortable was in the company of our family and animals. Then he could be himself because he felt "safe".

He could not ask for ketchup at McDonalds because he was scared (my daughter Caroline helped him with that), but he would talk endlessly to our animals just like they were people.

He knew they loved him unconditionally, and they would not laugh at him or question why he was scared; they would just love him for what he was — or wasn't.

That is why animals are so wonderful; they love you no matter what your faults are. They make no demands except to be loved and are grateful just to see your face

Joe's birthday is February 21st, and he would have been 38. I grieve for him everyday, but his birthday is so difficult because it was one of the happiest days of my life when he came into it. Now I will never again hug him, hear his laughter, or look in his beautiful eyes.

But in every animal that enters our doors, I see Joe. Because of you who have become our faithful supporters of his fund, he still lives in my heart and in the hearts of all the lives his fund has saved.



Perhaps our Facebook "friends" take pity on us shelter workers' constant attempts to find homes for our furry friends by the almost daily Facebook postings. Maybe it is simply fate that some dogs truly end up lucky — I don't know for sure. What I do know is that three special dogs have found their "furever" homes because of one of those things.

Long-time friends of the shelter and "Joe's Fund" supporters Jane and Bill Dornsife were not necessarily "in the market" for new dogs. Soon after "friending" me on Facebook, things quickly changed!

They had been grappling with the idea of taking home Celia, the very frightened, often stuffed-animal-like former puppy mill dog that had taken up residence under a desk in our Small Dog Building.

Jane convinced her husband that the time was right to adopt Celia and bring her home to their brood of pets. Little did her husband know, Jane and I had been scheming (in the nicest of ways!) that she would also adopt Ruby, a large black shepherd mix who was definitely not the most attractive dog we'd seen. Ruby's personality was stellar though. Once Jane and "Mr. Bill" arrived, it was just moments before my co-worker Ann and I "just happened" to bring Miss Ruby in to meet them as they were filling out Celia's adoption paperwork.

With a whole lot of "oh pleases," and even more eyelash batting, Ruby was going home too! Our "scheming" had worked! These dogs did not know it, but they had just won the doggy lottery!

Life was good for Celia and Ruby. Ruby, described as the "easiest and best dog that ever lived," quickly made her self at home. Celia will take more time to adjust, but she clearly loves her new home.

As the months passed, Jane would send us updates via Facebook. We were elated! We had found homes for two dogs that at just about any other shelter in the country would have been euthanized on arrival — either for "personality" or lack of it. I was so happy for Jane & Bill and the whole Dornsife clan!

I decided to push my luck, once again (torture IS my middle name)! There was one more dog that really needed the Dornsife's. I just knew it! Facing great opposition from almost every one, I did the unthinkable...I sent Jane a picture via Facebook of yet another pathetic, sad soul. All Jane could say to me was, "yes" or "no," right?

Georgie was his name. He was turned in as a stray and was one of the saddest, homeliest Rottweilers I'd ever seen. After some additional convincing from shelter manager Barbara Umlauf's daughter, Caroline a great friend of Jane, and more pleas on my part, "Mr. Bill" was convinced to come and adopt Georgie. (We knew we wouldn't have to work to convince Jane the second she saw Georgie's sad face!)

We had really outdone ourselves with this one! Jane and Bill were taking on a lot and they knew it! Georgie had double eye infections, a skin condition, a thyroid whose functioning was almost non-existent, was very arthritic with aching hind-legs, frost-bitten ears, and — to top it off — had pneumonia!

Luckily for Georgie (and for me), Jane was not upset with us in the least facing all the care Georgie would require. She was elated that we had trusted her with Georgie's care as we had with Ruby and Celia. All she wanted was for Georgie to "be well."

For a bit it was touch and go, and we weren't sure Big Georgie was going to make it. As I write this nearly a month later, I can boast and tell you Georgie pulled through! He has gained twenty-plus pounds, no longer has infected, sore eyes, and has what seems to be the beginning of a great shiny coat! Georgie is especially bonded with Mr. Bill (a.k.a, "Mr. Reluctant") as you can see in the photo.

These are the types of 'happy beginnings" that I live for. Without them, there would no reason for any of us to work so hard at Hillside. We must march on as we keep trying to find homes for the dogs deemed 'unadoptable" by most.

We must embrace our furry friends and care for them as best we can while they are with us at Hillside. Most of all, we have an obligation to each and every one of them to try and get them the very best homes possible.



## DREAMS SOMETIMES COME TRUE



In my last newsletter, I pleaded for a home for Bridget and Clyde, a mother and son who loved each other. They were inseparable, where one was, the other was right behind. If someone would take one of them for a walk, the other would scream at the fence until they returned.

They were from a cruelty case and were rescued a year and a half ago. They are completely housebroken, we spayed/neutered them, but no one wanted to adopt both.

We are blessed to the hills to have people who come to volunteer to walk our buddies like Ron Boscavage (aka "RonBo") and Bob Munn, regulars who both took a shine to Bridget and Clyde

who howled with delight when they saw them coming.

Bob, who lost his beloved "Buddy" loved Clyde but didn't want to break up the pair. He never had two dogs at one time, already has four cats, and feared that might be too difficult with his work schedule.

I explained to him that once you get a second dog, you'll always have more than one. Dogs enjoy the company of each other, and you don't have to feel guilty when you leave home because they have a companion.

Bob was still grieving for Buddy and felt guilty at the thought that he might be replacing him. We talk to people all the time who feel this way, and I explain to them that another pet will not "replace" the one you lost, but rather helps one waiting behind our fence who is hoping and praying to have a home where they are loved.

It is a tribute to the pet you lost to save another. I told Bob to imagine what he would have missed out on — all the love and joy Buddy gave — if he hadn't had him. After several months of my staff and RonBo putting our best efforts into gently pushing Bob to "take the plunge", he thrilled us when he said he would try taking both of them. If we had champagne, we would have celebrated!

Every time an animal leaves our shelter, we cross our fingers and say a prayer that everything will work out for the best. It is an emotional time for everyone. We kissed and hugged Bridget and Clyde and told them that they were going to a "forever home".

Bob called us several days later, elated that they were doing so great. Alleluia! What he said made me cry. He told me that he had been so lucky to have had Buddy he thought that would never happen again. Then he said, "I am really lucky; I got two dogs that I love like I loved Buddy!"

It is moments like this that make all the heartache worthwhile. Our hearts were filled with joy! It was a long wait for Bridget and Clyde, but it was worth every minute to become Bridget and Clyde Munn!

Determined to give Mr. P. some love and security before his days were over, Crystal took Mr. President that evening, swaddled in his blankie, from the Hillside and headed home where he was met by kitties, doggies (including a pit bull adopted from us a few months earlier) and oodles of unconditional love. We salute Crystal and her family, Missie the groomer, and our terrific supporters whose outpouring of well-wishes, donations, and encouragement were nothing short of amazing. At almost any other shelter, this dog would have been put down immediately, but Mr. President deserved the best we could give him, and by golly, with an amazing feat of teamwork, he got it!

Sadly, Mr. P's condition continued to deteriorate and, unable to bring him comfort any longer, it was clear the inevitable time had come. On Feb. 25th at the vet's office, cradled in Crystal's arms and smothered with kisses, Mr. President crossed the Rainbow Bridge. The days he spent with Crystal and her family were a blessing, he was surrounded by love, love, and more love. Although we grieve at his passing, we take comfort in knowing we were able to help him in some way and that he knew true love before he left this world. May you rest in peace, 'Mr. President'.
