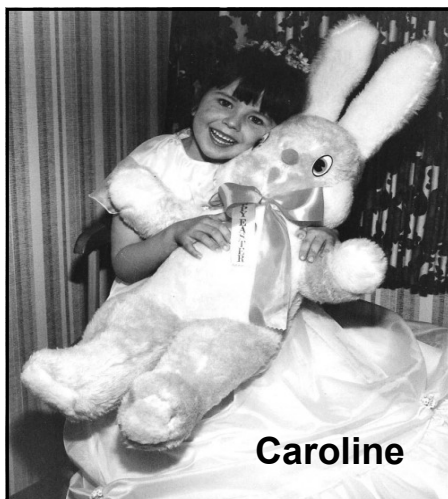

INDESCRIBABLE HEARTBREAK



Caroline

It is the darkest moment of my life. On March 7th, I lost my daughter, Caroline — my “Baby Doll”.

It was a shock and a crushing blow. Caroline was 41 and we were planning on celebrating her 42nd birthday on April 8th. That was not to be.

She had been ill off and on for awhile, but after treatment at three

different hospitals and enduring four surgeries we thought she’d be okay. But that was not to be, either. Caroline was succumbing to auto-immune disease that was destroying her vital organs.

She loved animals just like we do and she was so much like my Joe that way. She, like Joe, grew up at the Hillside. Caroline was close to Joe and loved him deeply. There is a picture of him in every room in her home.

She devoted tremendous time and energy in helping me with his fund and every pay period she made a very generous gift to Joe’s Fund.

Caroline graduated from Immaculata University where she was Class President for three years. She worked as an IT Recruitment Specialist.

Caroline was an extrovert, loved life, and her greatest gift was making people laugh. She was able to brighten any heart even in the worst of times. She had an infectious smile and huge personality.

Tears run down my cheeks as I read all the letters from people I didn’t know but who knew Caroline. They tell me how much she touched their lives when they were experiencing difficult times.

Caroline worked only two blocks from the World Trade Center on 9/11. I experienced one of the most terrifying moments in my life that day.

Because all services were down, and we could not get into New York, it was an agonizing eight hours until I knew she was alive. I was hysterical when she was finally able to call, but her bravery calmed me down. Amazing person, my Baby Doll.

Two months before Joe died, a mother cat gave birth to her three babies in our back yard — a yard in which my eight dogs were always running around. Dumbfounded, I said to Joe, “What cat would have her babies here?” His reply, “A very *smart* cat”. He moved them to his front yard where he took care of them for eight weeks until he died.

My Caroline took them all home with her to New York City where they became the most spoiled cats

As I write this, I am crying; I think that, given the way I feel, I may never stop crying. To lose one child is a nightmare. To lose two is a trauma beyond comprehension — one that I will never recover from.

I loved and adored Joe and Caroline from the first moment I held them. There is no stronger bond in the world.

When I realized Caroline was dying, I pleaded with her saying, "I'm not going to have a Joe and Caroline Fund. You will not leave me." And that, too, was not to be.

It is impossible to find the words that even come close to expressing my heartfelt thanks to you for your love, gifts, kind words and loyalty — there just are none that could do justice.

Throughout these devastating losses, you have shown me that I still have you and my Hillside Buddies. I will always have Joe and Caroline in my heart and they will continue to make so many miracles happen every day.

It is very difficult for me to even write these words, but want you to know that "Joe's Fund" will now be known as "The Joe and Caroline Spay/Neuter/Emergency Care Fund".

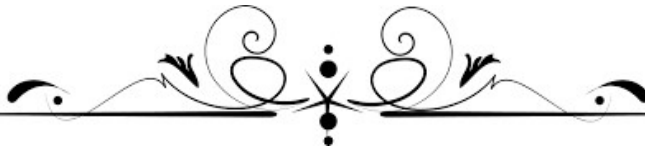

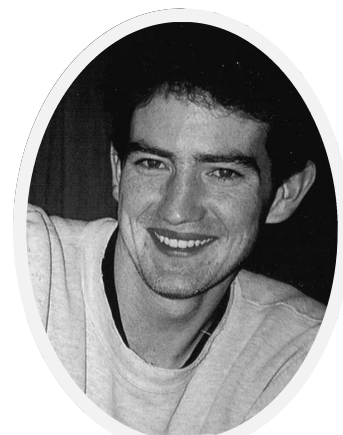

If you visit Hillside's cat quarters anytime soon, be on the lookout for the likes of characters right out of the pages of *Harry Potter*! Well, not really, but we do have a collection of handsome felines named after some of them. If you are wondering how this came about, it's quite simple.

With the large number of cats that come to us, our feline staff is sometimes hard-pressed to think of easy-to-remember names. If they come as a pair, no problem. If they come in to us as one large group, or perhaps gradually from the same location — as the *Harry Potter* group did — here's where head-scratching and creativity come into play.

For example, a cruelty case from McAdoo, PA brought us nine cats. Their living conditions were beyond filthy, so we gave them names that invoked thoughts of the total opposite: Comet, Ajax, Dawn, Dove, Mr. Clean, etc. This method also helps us remember who came in with whom. Back to the *Harry Potters*...

We received a report of a large number of cats in an unoccupied, very dirty house with one open window. Upon investigation, we discovered the mostly orange felines were not very friendly.

A nice neighbor volunteered to help us trap them, and it lasted over a period of several weeks since they went in and out of the house. All together, seventeen cats were humanely rounded up and brought to their new homes at Hillside.

Sadly, two were very ill and did not survive our rescue efforts. One had a hernia the size of an orange, the other was dehydrated and suffering from a serious infection.

Fifteen who have either been adopted or are still with us — thanks to the patience and TLC of our staff — were given *Harry Potter* character names.

CHIHUAHUAS

Four Chihuahuas in need of medical attention — two of them in *more* than desperate need — were rescued by Hillside SPCA and are now getting all the necessary care these sweet little souls require and deserve.

Of the foursome, two were 12-year-old sisters, both tiny and very fragile. They had only one tooth between them and even that one was bad.

The failure to provide veterinary care throughout their lives had resulted in massive, painful oral infections, in turn causing a disintegration, then loss of the bone in their bottom jaws.

They had been eating dry kibble by lapping up one piece at a time with their tongue and swallowing it whole. Their delicious discovery of soft food at Hillside was better than any dessert according to the joy on their faces!

One had also suffered a broken front leg that had never been set and had

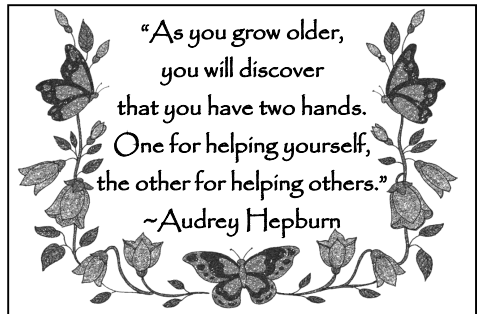
the onset of mammary cancer. The other had untreated slipped knee joints that had, in time, frozen and set into an awkward position and left her propelling, or “scooting” herself with her two front legs. Their new, and fabulous “parents” are thrilled to report she is currently using her back legs more and more. We think she might be dancing with delight with her sister!

The two other rescued Chihuahuas also had infected teeth and health issues. All four were suffering from severe hair loss.

A DAY IN THE LIFE

Your alarm goes off — but you didn't really need it — you've been awake for hours. Eyes wide open, thinking of the text you forgot to send, the email you forgot to reply to, or the medication you need to order.

Jump up and quickly get your dogs outside to "potty", then fill their food bowls, change blankets, and hand out meds to the majority of the animals in your house.

Hurry out the door. Don't have the time to brush your hair, nor do you really care because, in the big scheme of things, you are headed to a job that isn't about looks but hopefully saving lives.

Hurry up and head to the convenience store to fill up on a ridiculously unhealthy amount of caffeine because surely you will need it to face the inevitable ups and downs of the coming day.

And the days are *filled* with ups and downs. Dogs and cats come in to the shelter that you are thrilled to rescue from horrendous houses of horror. Others are turned in because less than compassionate owners have decided moving to a warmer climate is more "convenient" for them and their dog "just won't fit into their lifestyle anymore."

You take calls from people critical that you didn't handle a situation the way they thought you should, or complaining that you didn't respond quickly enough to pick up a deceased cat from their pavement (true story — you can't make this stuff up).

You race home to let your own dogs out again, feeling like you are running a marathon. If feeding, potty-ing, and laundering "old dog pee pads" were Olympic events, you'd be on the gold medal podium for sure.

You receive calls all day and night on your personal cell phone about lost dogs or injured animals and you worry — constantly. Your "end of the day," is never *really* the end of the day.

Welcome to my life. And so it goes day after day. But the bottom line is, I dedicate my life to animals; the ones that live with me in my home, the ones that find themselves at the Hillside, and the ones I never got to know but tried with all my might to help.

As crazy and hectic as my life is, I will get up tomorrow and do it all over again. Not because it's "easy and glamorous", but because I am a "mom" — and that's what moms do.

It is what all of us who work at Hillside SPCA do. We are not profusely thanked, we do not make tons of money. We do it as a labor of *love*.

We love each animal that comes our way, whether it be for an hour or a decade. Rats, cats, ferrets, pot-bellied pigs, dogs, you name it, we've seen it. This is just a day in our lives.

We ask your understanding when some days we seem frustrated or frazzled. We do try to do our best. We send heartfelt thanks to our supporters, families, and friends for all the encouragement, support, and understanding we receive.

We want you to know that we love these "shelter animals" like our own and would do whatever we can to help them. It's not an easy job, or a nine-to-five job, or something that you just leave behind when you close the gate on any given day. But it's what we do, and we promise to continue to do it the best way we can for as many animals as we can.

IN THE BOX

Here at Hillside we find kittens, puppies, cats and dogs far too often in boxes, crates, carriers, bags, barrels, totes and other containers either on our doorsteps, in the driveway, or tied to doorknobs or fences.

Some will include a note. Most include nothing but a very scared animal. More often than not, it's someone's pet — abandoned under cloak of darkness; always when the shelter is closed.

One morning in March, feline manager Becky arrived at the Hillside earlier than usual. It was barely daybreak. She noticed an unfamiliar box in a wheelbarrow near an entrance to the cat quarters.

Her immediate thought was, "Oh no, not another abandoned cat!" Well, the box was empty. A small chewed-out hole in the cardboard provided an escape route for whatever had been in the box.

Employees were alerted to be on the lookout for a loose animal on the grounds, possibly a kitten or cat.



However, we soon learned that a man found a ferret, didn't know what to do, and left it at our door. Now we knew what to look for.

Shortly thereafter, a light-colored ferret was spotted scurrying along the perimeter of one of the sheds. This prompted an all-out search that was not successful.

Later in the day when all was quiet, staff member Chris and her fiancé Jeff, quietly tiptoed all around the area near a shed and dumpster hoping to finally spot the escapee. No luck.

Becky approached the duo, and while they were engrossed in conversation, out from under the shed popped a little white head, followed by a very long, furry body. At that moment they knew this ferret was people friendly, most likely lured by their chatter. Jeff quickly scooped up the cold, shivering ferret and placed it inside his jacket, a nice warm spot.

Since the couple was familiar with ferrets, having had several of their own, they took him home and later decided to adopt him.

From the little white fuzzy guy (not yet named) and from all of us at Hillside, thank you Chris and Jeff for not giving up on your search, and of course, for giving him a great home!

HORRIFIC CONDITIONS

Hillside SPCA Humane Officers received a report of concern for the welfare of dogs and puppies inside a local residence.

It was three days after the Blizzard of 2017 covered the area with two feet of snow but there were still no visible footprints in the snow, no signs of any dogs having been outside the home or in the surrounding yard.

Once inside, we spoke with the owner and discovered a large number of dogs living in horrifying conditions. We removed fifteen dogs and puppies from this dangerous and unsanitary situation.

Most of the adult dogs had never been outside or even on a leash. As a result, they were extremely frightened and had to be physically carried to our transport crates.

One very special part of this rescue was one-year-old Momma Gizmo and her 10 three-week-old puppies, pictured here shortly after arriving

at the Hillside. These precious puppies and their mom flourished in our care.

The adorable adult dogs rescued are slowly building confidence, learning the art of gentle leash-walking, and meeting new people with the compassionate guidance of the dedicated Hillside staff.

The puppies have grown and, through our careful screening of potential adopters, found their forever homes. They have left their momma — and us...

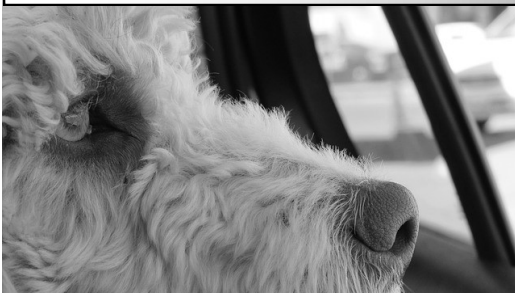
We believe they deserve a second chance at a loving, safe, secure life — and we work to insure these types of situations have the very best resolution possible.
