As I write this, it is 1:30 a.m. the morning of February 27^{th} – the date last year when my daughter, Caroline, entered the hospital for treatment of a broken ankle and the last time I ever spoke with her.

At 10:30 p.m. on the 27th I left her for the evening. Surgery was scheduled for the morning and she had given me a laundry list of items to bring for her when I came back before her operation.

At 2:00 a.m. on the 28th, I received a phone call that made my blood run cold; the hospital was calling to tell me Caroline was "crashing" and to come to the hospital as quickly as possible.

In my haze and horror, I told them they had the wrong mother; I

thought they made mistake. Then they told me she had been moved to the Intensive Care Unit. and we left the for hospital immediately.

When we arrived and walked into the room, I was completely unprepared for the shock. Caroline was on full life support and in a coma. Little did I ever know when I left her only hours before it would be our last time together. After eight agonizing days of watching her slipping away and leaving us, Caroline passed away on March 7th. I still can't think of it without screaming.

My son Joe's birthday is February 21st, and now having lost both my children I am in a state of emotional turmoil. People suggested I consider participating in grief therapy, but you are my therapists and your support of Joe and Caroline's Spay/

Neuter & Emergency Fund provides miracles keeping our buddies alive and it also keeps me alive. There are truly no words I can find to fully express my heartfelt thank

you for being there for us.

I feel so close to you, their fund's supporters who have saved so many lives. Just one of the miracles you have created through your friendship and love is the second chance at life for Diddy, a 10-year-old shepherd mix recently deliberately, and callously, shot directly in the face near his right eye with a .38 caliber handgun. The shooter fled the apartment of Diddy's owner — and so did Diddy.

Running the streets, severely wounded and bleeding profusely, Diddy was located with the help of police from the City of Pottsville

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

(Pa.). Hillside was notified and a representative rushed to the scene to assist with Diddy.

The shooter and weapon were located, he was questioned by police, subsequently admitted to shooting Diddy, was arrested and charged with numerous counts. including aggravated cruelty to an animal, and remanded to Schuykill County Prison.

The cruelty of this act was beyond comprehension. What pain and terror Diddy must have experienced!

News of this heinous and unprovoked shooting spread rapidly far and wide across social media and TV news stations. The public was outraged over the incident and its circumstances and very adamant in their pleas to help Diddy!

Upon learning about Diddy, I talked to my Joe and Caroline (I do that all the time...) and pledged that we would save him. Taken immediately to a veterinarian, Diddy's condition was grave. He had experienced profuse bleeding and was suffering from pneumonia as a result of aspiration of his blood. In addition, the surgeons experienced difficulty removing fragments of the bullet from his face.

Monitored around the clock, on IVs and antibiotics, Diddy fought to survive. His treatment was going to run into the thousands of dollars that Hillside's Joe & Caroline's Fund would bear the burden of covering, but it was clear that our mission was to give him every chance he deserved and our supporters stepped up to help immediately.

As the days progressed, Diddy started to show signs of recovery; walking, eating, drinking, going outside were all significant steps. After several days, he was released from the hospital

to continue his path to recovery.

Now in a loving home, Diddy will likely have permanent right side facial paralysis and loss of sight in his right eye as a result of his injuries. In addition, this poor guy was found to have testicular tumors (which could have been completely avoided had he been neutered) that will be treated in the near future.

We almost lost Diddy, but we all did it together — we saved a precious life and Diddy is now spending his days in the most wonderful home he could have ever dreamed of! We now hope that justice shall be done concerning the evil monster who shot Diddy.

I was so overwhelmed with all the support for Diddy that I cried both with joy and sadness – sadness that he suffered so but joy that we were able to give him a second chance at life and love. Children, adults, individuals, families, and businesses gave gifts and had fund-raising

events to help us with the cost of Diddy's care through Joe and Caroline's Spay/Neuter & Emergency Fund.

Diddy's care was expensive and many other shelters would have immediately put him to sleep, but at Hillside, we have vowed that every animal that enters our doors deserves everything we can do for them and the reason we can make that promise is because of *you* and *your* support. YOU are the reason we are able to say, "Yes! We CAN help!"

It would fill a book trying to name all of the precious lives saved through your gifts and your contributions to Hillside and to Joe and Caroline's Fund. Each year, I think, "It cannot get any worse." but each year proves me wrong, and this year was one of the worst years ever for dealing with cruelty cases in our history. The amount and scope of cases were far above and beyond anything that I, and my loving but totally exhausted staff, have ever witnessed. So you can see just how very much your loyalty and support means now more than ever.

Please, always be proud of yourselves for all you have done for our buddies, you truly do make a difference! I send a very special thank you from me, Joe, Caroline, and all of us at the Hillside for your love and support. And thank you for listening to me, my therapists.

Family Matters

ur newsletters often tell of emotionally wrenching cases of cruelty and neglect, woes of an over-populated facility, or the triumphant joy that comes when an animal who has waited so long finally finds their forever home. What you rarely read about is our staff – more importantly, *the families* that support our shelter staff.

Hillside SPCA staff do not hold typical "9 to 5 day jobs". You never know from day to day when they will be home or if a new furry friend will be tagging along when they do arrive. You don't know what joys or sorrows encompassed their day. You never know when, or at what hour, the phone will ring or a text message will come through – then on go the boots and off they go again. Family and social events are missed, get-togethers and holiday celebrations are planned accordingly to the shelter's needs.

Working at the Hillside is not just time spent "playing with" or caring for the animals in residence; it is embracing those who are unwanted, tossed aside, neglected and abused. It is seeing the good in every animal that comes through the door. It's gaining the trust of an animal whose owner can no longer keep them, for whatever reason. It's an understanding that is gained; a mutual respect for the animals as well as respect of the staff for each other.

The mission of the Hillside SPCA, the job, and the drive to make things better is a true part of the staff and at times it's all consuming. The bond that is created among staff is indescribable. It's a feeling and purpose no one can easily explain. It is who they are and it gets into their soul. They are the rescuers – the ones that rarely, if ever, see a light at the end of the tunnel yet venture back into that tunnel every day.

The families that stand behind Hillside staff are proud of them and the work they do. We know they are giving their all to make sure each and every animal they can save will be saved. As the people in their lives that love them dearly, we share in the triumphs of a good day and console them as best we can on a bad day.

We live in homes filled with dirty paw prints and nose smudges on the glass and fur balls on the floor. We are never quite sure how many four-legged family members we will have and when we try to set a limit we are met with a sweet smile and a non-committal, "Okay..."

Sometimes, we wonder *why* – why do these people we love and care for so much keep doing what they do? The hours are difficult, the heart ache never ending, and their efforts are often subjected to harsh criticism from those who unfairly sit in judgment.

Volunteers and donors often visit the shelter and remark to them, "I could never do what you do!" But we know why they do it – they do it because it is who they are. Even when it seems the bad forever outweighs the good, they smile and set their sights on the next adoption, the next life saved, the next "good day".

Our hope is that others will see that these people we so love are truly dedicated and willing to do what many others would not. We hope everyone can understand some "bad days" are harder to hide than others and ask for your patience during those times. And we ask that you join us in supporting our family members that help make Hillside SPCA a truly unique shelter!

Fab Foursome Finds Forever Home

Every animal that comes through the shelter doors has a story, some filled with tragedy or sadness, but some have a happy new beginning, whether they live their lives here being loved by the staff and volunteers or get adopted.

Scooter and Munchie, two Chihuahuas, won the hearts of workers and volunteers throughout their nearly year long stay. Gentle and

Victims of neglect, they came to us in rough shape. Scooter's coat was sparse from untreated fleas and suspected allergies. He was lethargic, thin, and his teeth were in need of care. A sweet boy who only looked to be held and loved, that demeanor remains to this day.

His little "brother" Munchie was in much the same poor physical condition as Scooter. A bit more tentative about meeting new people, he soon learned how wonderful gentle touches and real love felt. He blossomed with familiar friends and often rolled over for a belly rub.

Both boys began to thrive and heal with TLC by the staff and volunteers and loved it here. "The boys" became ambassadors for Hillside and were often seen at fundraisers, events, and educational visits to

local schools and day cares. They became seasoned "travelers" and enjoyed meeting people and representing Hillside SPCA.

Bailey, a senior Jack Russell gal, previously lived a very uncomfortable and painful life. She arrived here as a stray, picked up from the middle of a rural roadway by a kind passerby. Her condition was grave. She had a huge bloody sore on her back, a large tumor on the base of her tail, was blind in one eye, thin, disoriented and in discomfort. She was whisked off immediately to the vet. The sore began to heal with proper treatment and as weeks

passed Bailey's discomfort decreased and she began to truly enjoy life once again. She mingled with our other dogs, sought attention from her human friends and, best of all, she enjoyed her food!

Taco, a senior Chihuahua, was abandoned in a house with three other housemates. All were in need of medical attention, kindness, and care. Taco came to the shelter a bit disoriented and his fur was dull and sparse in spots. To our horror one night after hours, the Hillside canine quarters was broken into and Taco and his housemates were

stolen from the shelter! Thankfully, with the assistance of local police, they were all brought back safely within hours. They were placed in
